# So what's been keeping us busy this week?

Here are three pics showing what kept me busy for an afternoon. Our neighbours' two 'nodding tortoises' had lost their heads - 'Corroded Fulcrum' is a little-known but potentially terminal coconut tortoise ailment.




...and two tortoises happily nodding to each other in rehab.

**Jimmy Allen,** the shed's newest member, has been keeping himself busy working on a wood turned solitaire set. The first one he made was so popular that it has taken up permanent residence at Jim's daughter's house, so he's now working on a new set for himself.

Jimmy has perfected his technique, and manages to make two pieces from one piece of wood, by shaping one piece on half the length of the wood, then reversing the position of the wood in the lathe so he can shape a second piece from the other half before separating the two.

Jimmy has constructed a jig to make drilling precise holes in the dowels easier – a square section piece of wood was cut lengthways, on the diagonal (using a bandsaw) creating two triangle sectioned pieces. These were fixed to a base, to make a 'v' to rest the dowel in whilst cutting it.



**Anne** has been making rather Heath Robinson adaptions to a weaving loom, (which works pretty well considering it is constructed from an old clothes airer).

The bit of notched wood that holds the heddle bar up (I'm sure it has a technical name), is held in place with a clamp, while Anne experiments with height and placement..




HEDDLES: loops that lift up selected warp threads so the weft can be passed between them. These are attached to a HEDDLE BAR.

WARP: the threads that run top to bottom

WEFT: the thread that is passed from side to side.

### For these who are unfamiliar with looms...



SHED; the gap created between warp threads, when some are of them are lifted up.


SHED STICK: is used to hold the upper and lower threads apart, so the weft thread can be passed through.

Anne's current project is technically tapestry, rather than weaving, as the weft threads completely cover the warp threads.

The next part of the project is to make a stand for the loom, so it doesn't take up table space, and can be used wherever the light is best -maybe even outdoors.

## Japanese Joinery by Anne

The Japanese have a centuries old tradition of creating intricate joints that require no glue, screws or nails. I find it fascinating that something can be functional and visually appealing at the same time, allowing the joints themselves to be a decorative feature of the finished item.





# AS WE EMERGE FROM LOCKDOWN

## ... What might happen as we "Unlock" the Shed

The government are starting to ease restrictions on our movements, but the Shed Committee have still been meeting regularly during lockdown using Zoom video conferencing.

The Committee have been active in assessing what conditions we may have to put in place, as and when we are permitted to meet again. This relies not only on government rules, but also our Museum rules, and what the Committee deems safe to operate for members in the space we have.

Our first stage was to produce a "Risk Assessment" to list everything that could happen in the Shed, and what risk that poses for spreading the virus. This will include any mitigation or restrictions we have to put into place to ensure member safety. This assessment has been written, but requires the Committee to agree on all the strategy we believe is practical, and to buy items of PPE and sanitisers. The UKMSA organisation has also produced some guidance on this stage, which we are using in addition.

The second stage will be to extract the mitigations from the assessment, and produce a bulleted list of rules that will inform every Shed member of the safety conditions we must adhere to, in order to meet government guidelines. We will call this the "Unlock Protocol", or procedure.

The third stage, nearer the point at which we are permitted to meet, is to put up signage in the Shed, re-arrange where necessary, and disinfect all chairs, benches and equipment. At this point, and assuming the Museum is in agreement, we can invite members to return in a controlled manner. There will have to be a restricted number allowed at any one time, and this will be controlled by the Chairman on a rota basis. If we have offers from members to act as supervisors, then we could open on more days to allow more to attend per week.

I'm sure every member is really frustrated in not having the Shed facility available, nor being able to meet fellow members socially, but please bear with us at this time, and please abide by any rules that have to be put in place to keep you all safe. That is our duty of care.

Do please let the Chairman, Dave Shaw, know by email whether you could act as supervisor for a morning or afternoon session. The more we have, the more sessions we open. His email is david\_shaw@sky.com.

CARD TABLE 1. I was planning to sand this back to original wood colour and recover. (this is a good quality table). (to sell)







CARD TABLE 2 This is not a quality table. I was planning to lightly sand, paint black, and recover. (To sell)

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
